12th Night Coronation AS XLVI (Shire of Dragons Bay)

WORKING WITH RECYCLED FUR

Things to watch out for:

- Look for signs of shedding fur. Some furs (like Rabbit) will shed naturally, but excessive shedding can be a sign of insect damage.
- If there are silverfish or moths in the fur, you can be certain the fur will be damaged.
- Fur can also shed due to heat damage as dehydration of the leather causes the hair follicles to slip out.
- Neither insect damage or heat damage can be reversed.
- Don't worry about tears or rips as these can be repaired easily
- Damaged fur can still be used, you just need to remove the damaged pieces.

Preparing the fur:

- Regardless of your end use, a good start to recycle fur is to carefully remove the lining and pick apart the seams that shape the garment so that pieces lay as flat as possible.
- If the fur smells musty you can clean it with bran or oat bran. Do not wash the fur. Heat the bran on a tray in the oven for about 5 or 10 minutes. Make sure you don't burn it, and you should be able to touch the heated bran with your bare hands.
- Sprinkle the bran into the fur, working it deep into the pile. Leave it for a while and it will absorb smells and dirt. It will also leave the fur glossy.
- Shake the bran out, and then you can vacuum (yes vacuum!) to remove any residue. You can also carefully shake the fur outside to remove any further residue. (If you shake vigorously the fur could tear).
- Do not put in tumble dryer. Avoid heat at all times. (The exception is the hot bran).
- Get a stiff pet brush and start brushing the fur. This will remove any loose hairs (especially from insect damage). It is best to work the fur thoroughly at this stage to remove any loose hairs or damage, so you can then work with the good pieces.

When fur is damaged you really need to discard the damaged pieces and use the good pieces remaining.

Remodelling techniques

Cutting the fur

- You may be lucky and find that the panels that are already pieced are a suitable size for you to use.

- If not, select fur that blends in colour for piecing.
- Using a scalpel or very sharp craft knife cut panels carefully from the skin side.
- Try to avoid using scissors as no matter how careful you are they will cut the hairs, making it harder to hide your seams.
- If you must use scissors, part the hair and try to cut carefully between the fibres.

Piecing the fur

- Put the fur sides together, and using small overcast stitches sew the panels together. When flattened the seam should be nearly invisible.
- Office bulldog clips are an excellent way of holding fur pieces together as they avoid damage caused by pins.

Lining fur

- Fur may either be attached flat to a lining panel, or have a rolled edge.
- For a flat finish, align the edges and finish with an overcast or buttonhole stitch. You could also bind the edges with fabric stripping.
- For a rolled edge, sew a length of bias binding to the hair side of the fur. Roll the binding so that the raw side is concealed under the fur, and then you can stitch the binding down to your lining using small hand stitches.

Ongoing maintenance

- Keep out of direct sunlight where possible.
- Never leave your fur in the car on a hot day, or by an open fire or heater as heat will damage it quickly.
- Be aware that insects will wreak havoc with your careful work, so protect with insect repellent sachets or hangers.
- Store your fur in a cool place.

Preferably hang your fur. If it must be stored flat do not place anything on top or it will crush the pile. Do not store your fur in plastic or synthetic materials, it needs to breathe. Make a linen or cotton bag, or wrap in an old sheet.
