Some Recipies from Bal De Argent by THL Bella Romana Valori

Custard Tarts with Pomegranate Syrup

Tiny Shortcrust tart shells Custard: 400ml cream, 5 eggs, 50g sugar Cook on low heat on stove until thick, stir often. Pour into shells immediately as it sets fast.

Pomegranate Syrup: pomegranate juice & sugar 1/1 ratio Boil, stirring regularly, to dissolve sugar and reduce liquid and thicken Cool and spoon onto custard tarts

Decorate with Gold Leaf.

Torta Bianca (Ginger Cheesecake)

Shortcrust pastry for shells
Filling: mix together 500g Ricotta, 6 egg whites, 1/2 cup icing sugar
1&1/2 tsp ground ginger, 1/2 cup cream
Fill tart shells, bake 180C approx 25 mins
Makes about 40 tiny tarts

Andalusian Meatballs

500g lamb mince
80g crushed walnuts
2 eggs
1 Tbs ground coriander
1/2 Tbs ground caraway
1 tsp pepper
1/2 tsp salt
Combine all ingredients in a bowl
Form into small balls and fry in oil until just done

Yoghurt Sauce

500g plain greek yoghurt
1 &1/2 tsp cumin
Splash of lemon juice
Salt & pepper to taste
A little bit of finely diced mint would be nice too.








Fencing Marshal Master Don Donnchadh Baillie





"What is playing at the bind?"

You may have heard the term before, however you may not be completely familiar with its use in fencing. "The bind" is when a fencer engages with an opponents weapon with some level of pressure, that is more than fleeting, in an attempt to control the line before committing to an attack.

Playing at the bind is a significant technique shown in historical manuals.

Typically when swords are binding, the point should be threatening and fencers will "Play at the Bind", changing from weak to strong, trying to gain an advantage, before attacking with a sliding thrust. Generally the fencer who disengages when not in control of the line creates a moment when they can be struck easily with a thrust.

When in a bind it is possible to feel your opponent's intentions through the blade contact. Your opponent can do one of two things at the bind. They can use the strong of their sword to push through your sword, this is known as being hard at the sword, or he can relax from your pressure, known as being soft at the sword, in an attempt to circle around the sword to strike. It is important to learn to be able to feel which of these two actions your opponent is taking, then take the opposite action before your opponent manages to gain the advantage and attack.

A successful bind requires precise timing, control of distance and blade.

There are four binding actions often described in treatise. They are Opposition, Croisé, Bind, and Envelopment.

In the Opposition, a fencer engages an opponent's blade and then extends a thrust in that line, pushing the opponent's blade off line. When done with a straight thrust with just enough pressure to divert the opponent's blade off line. This bind is often referred to in Italian schools as a Glide and its sometimes described as a Glide with opposition. This is a strong attack when used in a straight thrust however it can be completed by engaging in any line. The sword engagement and pressure pushes your opponents blade off line as your sword slides down their blade in a thrust to the target also known as a sliding thrust.


The Bind takes the opponent's blade from any line diagonally to the opposing line. The action can be done from high to low line or vice versa. The bind is then followed with an attack using a lunge or a thrust maintaining contact with your opponents blade, however any attack can be used such as a diagonal cut. When attacking after the bind with a thrust it is sometimes referred to as a Transport and Glide.

The Croisé, also known as the Cross Bind, carries the opponent's blade vertically from one line to the opposite line on the same side. Vertically from high to low or vice versa. This action is sometimes described as a semibind.


An Envelopment is completed by engaging an opponents blade and then completing a full circular motion, maintaining blade contact and returning to the starting position. This action is also referred to as a Circular Transfer. The size of the circle in the envelopment needs to be small, the action completed with the wrist, otherwise the action would be to too slow and easily felt by your opponent. The action is generally followed by a gliding thrust continues to maintain a constant pressure and therefore control of the opponent's blade but can be followed by any attack.

In Cut and Thrust combat we are given the option to place cuts, so there may be times when it is better to "Leave the bind behind" and attack with a cut. This is the moment when you decide to disengage from the bind to deliver a cut. If done correctly, leaving the bind can create an opening in your opponents defence that will allow you to strike with a cut. An example would be when you are in a bind and too close to effectively thrust, by stepping away from your opponents blade you can leave the bind and cut to your opponents arm or head. This movement must be done in the same tempo as the voiding step.

By using the binds with correct distance and tempo, you can control your opponents blade and therefore control the line. Maintaining pressure on the bind, sometimes referred to as presence in the bind, you are better able to determine how and when your opponent will react to the bind and therefore best time to attack, either with a thrust or a cut.

Atack with a Cut


Fencing Cuts and Grips

Here in Aneala, we have usually fenced in English with English descriptions for the cuts and attacks. Most of the cuts, thrusts and attacks that I teach have come from Italian, and it is not uncommon that we have masters come across and teach, using the original Italian language to describe the moves.


Here I present to you a short list of Italian words, a diagram of common cuts, and a diagram of hand holds/positions.

Italian	English
Roverso / Reversa Fendente Madritto Squalembrato Tondo	Reverse Slash Cut Diagonal Lit. Round (horizontal arc) False
Falso Manco Dritto Montonte	Remainder Straight Upright

You will notice that the cuts form an asterisk; a combination of a + and an x. These 8 slices form the basis of much of European fencing, often referred to here in Aneala as "the 8 cuts". The central point of the 8 cuts can be focused on the head, the upper torso (heart) or the groyne/thigh. I have illustrated this here:



Your sword can begin its cuts from any ward that you have learned, however not all cuts are possible or even advisable from the ward position.

To break this down, if your hand is to your side or behind you, you will find that there are 3 cuts that are very effective and efficient in timing (fastest tempo) to reach your opponent, 2-3 cuts that are generally a bit slower but still timely enough (moderate tempo), 1-2 cuts that is slow and clumsy, and usually 2-3 cuts that are not possible (each ward will have a variation of these that adds to 8 cuts). Have a play with this concept and discover which are which.

The idea of this is to create a feeling of how you can bring your sword to bear on the preferred target of the opponent in front of you from any ward, or at worst wherever your sword has ended up after perhaps being deflected by your opponent. This creates the ability to flow with your blade.

Flow is where your sword continues to move from ward to attack to ward to attack. A ward can be an intentional location you wanted to end up, or it can be close to the accidental location your sword and hand have got to. By knowing how to move your sword into a cut along the asterisk to your attack from any position, you form the basis of always being able to move back into attack.




