Lochac Cooks Guild



Cherry pottage (vegetarian)

'Tak cheryes & do out the stones & grynde hem wel & draw hem thorw a streynour & do it in a pot. & do therto whit gres or swete botere & myed wastel bred, & cast therto good wyn & sugre, & salte it & stere it wel togedere, & dresse it in disches; and set theryn clowe gilofre, & strewe sugre aboue.'

– Mnesitheus, quoted in Oribasius, Medical Collections 4, 4, 1.

This cherry pottage was a genteel dish, being made with wine and white bread, and called for the use of precious white sugar! Soluble gold gouache can be used to gild the tops of whole cloves, but don't eat them as they are very strong – they're just for decoration here.

Serves 6

Ingredients

900g fresh ripe red cherries 350ml red wine 175g white sugar 50g unsalted butter 225g soft white breadcrumbs Pinch of salt Flower heads of small clove pinks or gilded whole cloves (according to season) Coarse white sugar for sprinkling

Method

Wash the cherries and discard the stems and stones. Purée the fruit in a blender with 150ml of the wine and half the sugar. Add a little more wine if you need to. Melt the butter in a saucepan and add the fruit purée, breadcrumbs, remaining wine, sugar and salt. Simmer, stirring steadily, until the purée is very thick. Pour into a serving bowl, cover and leave to cool. When quite cold, decorate the edge of the bowl with flowers or whole cloves, and sprinkle coarse sugar over the centre.

Timing and Tempo in Italian Fencing

Timing and tempo are essential aspects of fencing. The fencer aims to control the distance and timing of their attacks by controlling the tempo of the bout. In fencing, Timing refers to the ability to execute an attack or counterattack at the right moment. This means executing a thrust or lunge at the exact moment when the opponent is most vulnerable. Timing of a feint, or false attack, to create an opening for a real attack. This requires an understanding of distance and timing, as well as a constant awareness of the opponent's movements.

To improve your timing in fencing, it's important to practice drills that focus on these different aspects of timing. By training your body to react quickly and accurately, you'll be better equipped to make split-second decisions while fencing. There is a balance between observation, anticipation, and action. It is important to learn to perceive the slightest cues from your opponent—a shift in weight, a movement of the eyes, or the subtle positioning of the blade. This awareness allows fencers to determine the most opportune moment to strike or parry.

Tempo refers to the rhythm or pace of the bout. It involves manipulating the speed, intensity, and using a variation of actions to control your opponent. By disrupting your opponent's tempo while maintaining your own, a fencer can assert dominance upon the bout. A fencer uses changes in tempo to disrupt their opponent's rhythm and create openings for attacks. This requires quick reflexes, the ability to read the opponent's movements, and an understanding of the principles of timing and distance.

For example, if you're facing an opponent who is very aggressive and likes to attack quickly, you can use a slower tempo to throw them off and create openings for counter-attacks. Alternatively, if you're facing an opponent who is very cautious and defensive, you can use a faster tempo to pressure them and force them to make mistakes.

The Italian Masters like Capo Ferro, Agrippa, and Fabris, emphasize a balance of timing and tempo. Their treatises note the importance of balance, footwork, and blade work, together with timing and tempo. With practice these principles become instinctive responses ingrained in muscle memory.

In conclusion, timing and tempo stand at the core of fencing. By mastering these techniques, you'll be better equipped to anticipate your opponent's moves, create openings for attacks, and gain an advantage in matches.


